Course outline

Small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) have a significant impact on economic growth and employment. Amid the ongoing globalization of the economy and the aging of the population, there is a growing expectation that SMEs will create new technologies and business models.

Not a few SMEs are dynamic, flexible, and have innovative capabilities. They are of high value under rapidly changing social-economic circumstances. On the other hand, SMEs face severe obstacles to achieve growth potentials, such as access to finance and human capital.

In this class, we will analyze how SMEs have played a crucial role in the postwar Japanese economy and how the Japanese government has facilitated the competitiveness of SMEs. We will also discuss the various issues surrounding SMEs nowadays.

Attainment objectives

To understand how important SMEs are in the national economy as well as the regional economy.

To understand how SME policy has been planned and implemented in Japan.

Study Method

(1) Discussion in the classroom

Students give a short presentation based on their assigned reading material. Lively discussions are expected.

2 Fieldwork (SMEs, local governments, science parks, etc.)

We undertake interviews with SME owners and factory tours in Shiga Prefecture and Kyoto City.
